### For the fourteenth consecutive year,


WorldWise Microfinance increased our support for entrepreneurs in the developing world. We continued to grow our programs by identifying and collaborating with responsible and reliable partners. We opened new programs in Ghana and Kenya and expect both programs to expand in 2025.

Despite challenges in each of the countries, we distributed a record 615 loans in 2024. This represents a 71% increase in the number of loans. At the same time, our average loan size has increased. Strong oversight and effective monitoring of the loan portfolios are keys to the long-term success and sustainability of our programs.

# HAITI

In 2021, the President of Haiti was assassinated, plunging the **nation into chaos.** Initially, our partner, an agricultural cooperative, was minimally impacted by the chaos. By mid-2023 the head of the cooperative, Guy Louis was forced to flee the country for his safety.

Since then, Guy received sporadic reports about the loan program. In 2024, those reports stopped, and we have **no current program data**. While **we remain optimistic that a loan program continues** to function, we are no longer providing additional money to Haiti.



# PAKISTAN

Michael Commission of the Comm



Our partner, Unity in Hope, piloted a loan program in Islamabad in 2023, and 18 loans were made. All loans went to women and were fully repaid. We mutually agreed to **end the program** in 2024, with all money recovered by Wisconsin Microfinance.

A few of our lessons learned from this pilot include:

- Communicate partner time commitments clearly: Staff on the ground must have the time and ability to manage the loan program.
- Identify alternative funding sources early: A requirement of our programs is that after 4 loans, recipients must have access to an alternative funding source for future loans. Despite repeated attempts to identify an alternative source, none were identified in Islamabad.
